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

FJPL reserves the right to refuse or discard donations as identified below: Condition: Books with the following flaws: taped, torn, or bent covers; damaged spines, malodorous; wet, mildewed, or excessively dirty books; and/or excessive underlining or writing on the pages.

Age limitations in certain categories:

Health—must not be older than 5 years Self-Help—must not be older than 5 years Business—must not be older than 5 years Encyclopedias—must not be older than 2 years (some exceptions) Textbooks, any category—must not be older than 5 years Computers—must not be older than 3 years

Categories: We cannot accept the following: Magazines Sets (or partial sets) of law books Readers Digest Condensed Books Home-recorded videos

An interview with the new President:

Diane Schleifstein (DS) answers questions from Annette Centanni (AC)

AC: Diane, you have worn many hats at the Friends. When did you first become a Friend, and why did you become involved?

AC: As a Friend, what are some of the activities you have participated in? So far, what has been your favorite activity? Least favorite?

DS: My first assignment was an arduous one: it involved diving into boxes of books at the Naval Air Station in Belle Chase, which had received a huge donation of books from the closing Naval Base in Iceland. Cheryl Ledet, Rick and Joan Demers and I took on the task of getting them all back to the Center on Riverside. Little by little, I started working at the Sale, the Store, Amazon, the book cart at the Wagner Branch Library, and as a member of the Board. My favorite activities are working with the Amazon ladies who pack and list books, waiting on customers at the Store, and wrapping Christmas presents at Barnes & Noble when the Friends participated in that program; my least favorite activity is bending over to unpack books at book sale setup.

AC: What other interests or hobbies outside the Friends do you enjoy?

DS: I love playing Mahjongg and canasta at the People Program. I also enjoy crocheting and knitting, though I'm not currently working on anything. I spend a lot of time reading, walking, and enjoying my grandchildren.

AC: Who or what in the Friends organization has influenced you or impacted you the most?

DS: I am grateful to Joan Demers for immersing me into the Friends the way she did on the Iceland project, and for encouraging me to get more involved. More recently, Anna Campos helped me set up a library at Shir Chadash, and Jan DeVidts taught me to pack and post Amazon sales.

AC: Being President is a great challenge and a huge commitment. We thank you in advance for the many hours you will spend in service to all of us. Why did you accept the invitation to take the office?

It has been an uneventful, El Niño kind of summer at the Center, the Store and on the Amazon front. What's cooking at the Friends?

Lemon Cheese Bars

Makes: 24 bars Preparation Time: 15 minutes Baking Time: 27 to 30 minutes

package (18.25 ounces) plain lemon cake mix
1/3 cup vegetable oil, such as canola, corn, safflower, soybean, or sunflower
large eggs
package (8 ounces) cream cheese, at room temperature
1/3 cup sugar
tablespoons fresh lemon juice (from about 1 lemon)

- 1. Place a rack in the center of the oven and preheat the oven to 350°F. Set aside an ungreased 13- by 9- inch baking pan.
- 2. Place the cake mix, oil, and 1 egg in a large mixing bowl. Blend with an electric mixer on low speed for 1 1/2 to 2 minutes. Stop the machine and scrape down the sides of the bowl with a rubber spatula. The mixture should be crumbly. Reserve 1 cup for the topping. Transfer the remaining crust mixture to the pan. Using your fingertips, press the mixture evenly over the bottom of the pan so that it reaches all sides. Place the pan in the oven.
- 3. Bake the crust until it is light brown, 13 to 15 minutes. Remove the pan from the oven and set aside. Leave the oven on.
- 4. For the filling, place the cream cheese in the same mixing bowl used to prepare the crust, and with the same beaters (no need to clean either) blend with an electric mixer on low speed until creamy, 30 seconds. Stop the machine and add the sugar, lemon juice, and remaining 1 egg. Beat on low speed until well combined, 1 to 2 minutes. Use the rubber spatula to spread the filling over the baked crust so that it covers the entire surface. Scatter the reserved crust mixture over the filling. Place the pan in the oven.
- 5. Bake the cake until the crust is golden brown and the filing just starts to set, 14 to 15 minutes. Remove the pan from the oven and place it on a wire rack to cool for 30 minutes.
- 6. Cut the cake into 24 bars. Remove the bars from the pan with a metal spatula, and serve.

(Store these bars, covered in plastic wrap, at room temperature for up to 4 days or in the refrigerator for up to 1 week. Or freeze them, wrapped in aluminum foil, for up to 6 months. Thaw the bars overnight in the refrigerator before serving.)
