

# Bylaws Revisions, Again

Due to recent events, the Friends Board has found a need to revise our Bylaws once more. They were last updated in February 2021 to reflect the need for online participation and voting during the pandemic. The major change this time will be the procedure for approving the budget. Additional changes include a notice that, for liability reasons, the Friends will not sponsor alcohol at library events; and the addition of the Awards Chair to the list of committee chairs. The new Bylaws will be presented at the October 4, 2023, General Meeting. A vote for approval will be taken at the first General Meeting in 2024. ## "Fashioning America: Grit to Glamour" to be featured at Friends of the Jefferson Public Library meeting

The Friends of the Jefferson Public Library will hold a General Meeting on Wednesday, October 4, at 10 a.m. at the East Bank Regional Library, 4747 W. Napoleon Avenue, in Metairie. The guest speaker will be Mel Buchanan, Curator of Decorative Arts and Design at the New Orleans Museum of Art. Her topic on October 4 will be an overview of the new exhibition entitled "Fashioning America: Grit to Glamour."

The exhibition, on view at NOMA through November 26, takes a broad look at fashion history with an emphasis on the spirit of innovation and the diversity of the United States' fashion heritage. The exhibition spotlights over 100 American designers and brands with garments from the 19<sup>th</sup> century to the present day.

Three copies of the exhibition catalog, valued at \$65 each, as well as a docent-led tour for four people, will be awarded as door prizes. Winners must be present when tickets are pulled at the end of the meeting.

Volunteers will be able to sign up to help at the Big Book Sale, scheduled for October 20-22, 2023, with set up day on October 19. The sale will be held at the Pontchartrain Center in Kenner.

<u>Stories aside, other endeavors Friends</u> <u>took part in this summer</u> were numerous and varied.

One of our missions is to furnish support to the library by providing funding for projects, small and large, not covered in their budget. There were many such opportunities to do so this summer.

We purchased two copies each of five books requested by East and West Bank Regional Libraries.

We furnished three prizes for the recently held See **The Shadow** page 7

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**Adult Spelling Bee**: \$20, \$15, and \$10 certificates redeemable at our Big Book Sale.

The Friends provided pizza and snacks for the wellattended **Teen Lock-In** library event held on July 29-30<sup>th</sup> at EBR.

The Friends hosted a **Graduation Reception** in August for library staff members who had earned their Masters Degrees in Library Science. It was attended by **Parish President Cynthia Lee Sheng** as well as 30 library staff members. **Director Jessica Styons** noted that she would like to make this reception an annual event, since she felt that it was both affirming for the graduates and an encouragement to those who might be thinking of furthering their education. **Judy Welcker and her committee of volunteers** furnished the refreshments and their set-up. The Summer Reading Program, which the Friends partially underwrite every year, surpassed all expectations, reported Erin Korosi, Youth Services Coordinator. The Friends provided tote bags and other prizes to the hundreds of participants of all ages who had read and attended various programs all summer long.

The board voted to donate 25-30 "coffee table-type" books per West Bank Regional's request for prizes for their new pilot program, **Bingo for Books**. It is scheduled to start in September and run through January 2024. Sorters will be on the lookout for "nearly-new" books that fit the description. These will be delivered to WBR, no doubt, by **Sue Craig**, who is one of our two liaison persons who cover everything West Bank.

Back in our own Sorting Center and imme-

<u>diate environs</u>, more activities of note have been transpiring.

Sharon Simmons, our new Louisiana state "volunteer hours logger," has reported that during the month of July alone, 62 volunteers contributed a total of 1,032 hours of service. This included the Store, which had reported 122 hours from 17 volunteers.

One relatively new sorter, **Betty Small**, and one brand new one, **Barbara Starks**, have begun trying their hands at listing under the tutelage of both **Anna Campos** and **Mary Penot**. **Betty** and **Barbara** have also mastered the art of packing Amazon sales and getting them out for prompt mail delivery.

Friends once again partnered with the library on July 29<sup>th</sup> to co-host another **Puzzle Extravaganza**. This time the profits totaled **\$413**.

Raise-a-Reader has been busy. One of my fondest childhood memories has been of the times my mother and I spent reading to each other and laughing over the antics of "Freddy the Pig" and the adventures in Carolyn Haywood's "Eddie" and "Betsy" books. Sandra Blount and her crew of Collette Ricaud and Marie Orth have been endeavoring to foster those same memories in others with the Raise-a-Reader packets they pack for distribution in East and West Bank hospitals. New mothers each receive a board book and literature encouraging them to read to their infants and to seek and utilize library membership. Sandra adds that Raise-a-Reader could not continue its mission without the ancillary services of Patricia Cox and Peg Phelps, who see to the printing of the literature, the purchase of bags, and the purchase of board books. Sue **Craig** has been in charge of delivery to the hospitals

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for many years.

Amazon Internet Sales, also! Due to the dedication and conscientiousness of listers and packers, our "Amazon" business continues to thrive. The net profits for the months of June and July totaled \$8,048.89. Four books each sold for over \$100, but the most expensive sale was a book on Mad Magazine artwork, which sold for \$289! Our Amazon account continues to report a 99% lifetime feedback satisfaction rating.

At the Store. Store Manager Patricia Cox reported this issues' news to me with a sigh. In her own words, "INFLATION is a bummer!" She stated, "The 'Big' store news is that inflation is causing us to raise the price on our signature NOLA Throws." Patricia went on, "Our recent order of afghans brought

a surprise on the invoice—a \$7 increase in the price of each blanket."

Even though shipping costs have increased, **Patricia** has managed to keep the base price the same until now. This time, however, the store will have to raise the selling price by \$5, thus make \$2 less profit on each sale. She says that this will keep the price under \$50 per afghan.

Sorry you had to read it first here, Dear Readers. But news is news. It might help to remember that the New Orleans Afghan is a unique gift, only available at our store. Visit the Store, commiserate with the staff, then buy several of the hundreds of bargains whose prices are still the best around town.

## **Book Carts: Year-round mini book sales**

There is now an honor-system book cart in just about every Jefferson Parish library branch. The Old Metairie Branch supports two and the newly-minted East Bank Regional Branch is in the process of setting up



a needed second. These carts each have an attached donation box to collect the modest fees suggested on the displayed paperbacks. For the last few years, the carts have become increasingly popular, and have begun to average upwards of \$3,000-\$3,500 per year.

Eight volunteers presently service their branches once to twice monthly, or as needed. They refill their carts, change strategies as deemed necessary, and collect the donations. Sue Craig services four libraries: Belle Terre, Lafitte, Live Oak, and Westwego. Will Hunn takes care of Gretna and West Bank Regional. Diane Schleifstein services Wagner and North Kenner. Also, Rodney Tujague services both River Ridge and Rosedale; Judy Zawislak, Old Metairie; Patricia Cox, Lakeshore; Jo Ann Rosenfeld, East Bank Regional;

and an Amazon volunteer, the Harahan Branch. Each volunteer is aware of the needs/desires of his own patrons, and chooses books that are most likely to please.

# What's cooking at the Friends?

Lisa Conescu made her biscotti for the MLIS reception in August.

### Mandel Bread Almond flavored

1 cup sugar 2 tsp. baking powder

½ cup Crisco3/4 tsp salt3 eggs1 tsp. vanilla

3 cups flour 1 cup nuts (almonds)

Blend sugar and Crisco until creamy. Add 1 egg at a time; add vanilla and nuts. Add flour, baking powder and salt. This must be mixed by hand; consistency will be like soft rubber until baked. Spread on ungreased baking pan into a long, low loaf and bake at 375 degrees for 25 minutes.

Before it cools, cut into strips. Stand these strips with raw sides up. Bake them again, until they brown in the oven.

Lisa says, "I know it as a family recipe handed down to me. It is a little denser than some biscotti. (The crumbs after the second bake are extra delicious!)"
